Our Early Portville Village Schools

Historical records state that as early as 1822 children were being schooled in Portville. We know that the teacher's name was Anna Carpenter but do not know the location of the school.

In 1830 a small schoolhouse with a large fireplace was constructed by a creek that empties into the Allegheny River near Burnt Hill. As you travel west to Olean, it's where the valley narrows and the river is visible on the left with the railroad tracks on the right. Because there is no bridge today, it's hard to visualize that a creek was once there. The water now flows through a sluice pipe under the road. It was in this school that fifteen year old Samuel Dexter Morris, the son of Portville's first settler, taught children from the Town of Portville.




In 1854 a schoolhouse was built on Temple Street and during the next several decades, nine other oneroom schoolhouses were being built throughout the Town of Portville to serve the educational needs of the children living in the farming communities.

The wooden structure to the left is from a 1900 photo of the Union Free school house that was built in 1875 at 27 North Main Street.

This building was located near the vestiges of the Genesee Valley Canal that run along the edge of the athletic fields behind the Portville Manor. The photo shows the building during one of the many floods that occurred in Portville prior to the building of the dike system.


In the years 1903-04 The Portville Union High School was erected in front of the old wooden school building. Pictured on the left, it was a three story high brick structure heated by three furnaces. The water fountains were supplied by spring water from the village system. A Bell Telephone line ran into the principal's office. A large athletic field was later added.





1931 Portville Union High School Men's Basketball Team

Women Workers

Not all Portville women stayed home in the early 20th Century. As you can see from the above photo, over half of the employees of the Portville Basket Factory were women. This factory was located on Anderson Road, near the tannery that was discussed in our last newsletter. Grape baskets of varying sizes were made from sheets of veneer that had been cut from hardwood. Logs were cut into lengths, steamed in vats and put through a lathe. Cut into different lengths and thickness, they were dried in the sun. Then they were nailed together to make the baskets.




