Dorothy was a respected member of the equestrian community, exhibiting her Saddlebred and Arabian horses both locally and nationally. She loved to encourage young people to ride, especially in the art of saddleseat horsemanship through her lesson programs and as a leader of the Luck Aces 4-H Club. Many of her students, including her daughter and granddaughter have gone on to win state and national recognition in the show ring.

Dorothy, herself, continued riding and showing into her 70s, an unusual feat for

any equestrian.

Combining her love of art and horses, in 1986 she created the "Me and My Pony" educational coloring book series which sold nationally. She completed her last book in 2009.

Dottie's love for animals was well known. Besides her horses, she also raised and trained Labrador retrievers and English setters.

Dorothy worked as a DJ for WHDL during WWII and co-hosted a radio show called "Queen for a Day" with Don McClean, Mac Sue and Grace Smith at the Castle restaurant. She also narrated fashion shows for Bradners and other businesses and clubs.

In 1992, after the death of her husband, Dottie managed Olean Limousine service as both owner and president until its sale in 1995. After selling, she continued to enjoy her horses, her family's involvement with them and traveling. Some of her trips included Alaska, Hawaii
